I think that as always we will find the Ascension an event which gives us great encouragement and comfort - and not least in this time of anxiety and frustration. Before he parted from his disciples, Jesus promised that he would be with them always, to the end of time. We are reminded that he is with us, always, and not least in these difficult days as the 'lockdown' continues, even if in a slightly modified form. During these past seven weeks there has been much loneliness, as well as anxiety. But we are never truly alone, for Jesus says to us 'I am with you'. He also says to us 'Do not be afraid'.

Blessed Virgin, illumine the minds of men and women engaged in scientific research, that they may find effective solutions to overcome this virus. Support national leaders, that with wisdom, solicitude and generosity they may come to the aid of those lacking the basic necessities of life and may devise social and economic solutions inspired by farsightedness and solidarity.

Beloved Mother, help us to realise that we are all members of one great family and to recognise the bond that unites us, so that in a spirit of fraternity and solidarity, we can help to alleviate countless

situations of poverty and need. Make us strong in faith, persevering in service, constant in prayer. THE SAINTS OF EAST ANGLIA

I : A LAND OF SAINTS

Some have remarked on the fact that East Anglia has been relatively mildly affected by the Coronavirus : maybe one cause of this has been the protective prayers of East Anglia's Saints. For it is indeed a Land of Saints. There are the Patron Saints of the diocese : Our Lady, St.Felix, St.Edmund, and St.Etheldreda. And then those other saints who lived within its boundaries, St.Fursey, St.Botolph, St.Walstan, St.Withburga. The East Anglian Martyrs in later times, and those holy women Julian of Norwich and Margery Kempe of King's Lynn. It will be good to remind ourselves of who these elder brothers and sisters of ours in the Faith are and what they accomplished, because they continue to be a source of inspiration to the Church of today, and powerful intercessors in the heavenly court.

The principal Patron of the diocese of East Anglia is, of course Our Lady. Not that she walked the fields and beaches of East Anglia, as the other patrons did, but because her National Shrine lies within the bounds of the diocese, at Walsingham. And what a great privilege and singular honour it is for our diocese to have within it the place where Mary herself appeared in 1061. Our Lady requesting the building of a Holy House, to which pilgrims could come and have a visual reminder that the Incarnation took place at such a house in Nazareth, when the Word was made flesh in the womb and in the house of Mary. A reminder too that Mary herself became a House - a house in which for nine months the Maker of the World lived, having taken from Mary our human flesh. Mary of Walsingham, Mary of East Anglia. Our Mother who watches over us with great tenderness
