### Unfortunate

I'm told that at the 9.30am Mass last Sunday,  
nineteen people who had come late stood outside  
the church. From the door it had appeared to them  
that there was no distanced-space for them to be  
able to come in. But from where I was, I could see  
plenty of space in the middle of the church - we  
had by no means reached our distanced capacity of  
60/70. I think that what must have happened is that  
due to there being people seated at the **end**  
of every row, it appeared from the door that the  
church was full, when in fact it wasn't. Please  
would you think seriously about occupying the  
very end seats of every row, nearest to the aisle, at  
Sunday Mass : Some people will be shy about  
clambering over you to get to unoccupied seats in  
the middle of the row, and sometimes, as last  
Sunday, it will appear that the church is full when

in fact it is not. I'd be most grateful for your co-operation in this. It is so important that we make people feel welcome.

**Also unfortunate** I've heard indirectly that someone had a fall whilst working in the Memorial Garden recently, and had difficulty in getting home. Our Safeguarding Officers suggest that (i) it might be best not to work alone in the Garden, (ii) best to tell someone if you are going to do so, to which I would add (iii) it might be wise to carry a mobile 'phone in such a situation.

### **Come on, you'll enjoy it! SEVEN THINGS WHICH ARE DISTINCTIVE ABOUT ROMAN CATHOLICISM**

#### **VII. We care passionately about Life and Social issues.**

Catholics are deeply aware of the immense worth, and indeed the sanctity, of human life. We believe that all life comes from God, and belongs to Him. The Lord has given, and it is for the Lord to take away in his good time. Therefore we are fiercely opposed to Abortion, which we see as a disobeying of the commandment 'You shall not kill'. We believe that at the moment of conception a new life comes into being, and that it is ridiculous to say that it is not killing if a child has not yet been born, but only killing if it has been. That is totally artificial and dishonest. And we hate the falseness of speaking about a harmless-sounding 'termination' rather than of a killing, which is what it is. We can't help feeling cynical about the fact that all hell breaks loose if someone uses a racist word, and yet most people don't turn a hair at the mass-killing which is abortion. Similarly we are bitterly opposed to Euthanasia, because this no less is a destroying of human life - man presuming to take on the role of God in bringing a life to an end.

And because of our conviction as to the worth of the human person as created by God, we are bitterly opposed to all that mitigates against the right valuing and honouring of human life. We work for justice and fairness, and oppose all oppression and exploitation of people. We champion the rights of the downtrodden, the deprived, and those in poverty. We are aware that 'we are indeed our brothers keeper', and that to fail to come to the aid of those in need of help is to fail to come to the assistance of Our Lord himself. The Catholic church has in so many different countries and situations been the voice of those who are not listened to, and the champion of those who are down-trodden.

In this series we have focused on seven things which are distinctive about Roman Catholicism. I know that so much more can be said, and that there are other things too which make Catholicism challenging, worthy of respect, and the fully authentic form of Christianity..
