SO FAR THY GRACE.....

On Friday this week we celebrate the feast of St.John Henry Newman (1801-1890), one of the more recent of our English saints. Not least in his legacy to us is the poem, now often sung as a hymn, *Lead, kindly Light*, which contains the line

*So long thy power hath blest me,
Sure it still will lead me on....*

Newman wrote the poem on a sea voyage after a very serious illness, out in the far Mediteranean. He was a young man, but already he was able to look back & see how God had directed the course of his life so far, guarding, guiding & bringing him most recently through his dangerous illness.

I think all of us do well to follow Newman's example and reflect on our past, seeing God's love and care for us, perhaps over many many years. We have all of us been through times of difficulty, maybe times when we've felt

overwhelmed, and quite unable to cope. But somehow God has seen us through. He's never abandoned us, He's been with us in our difficult times. All of us are called, in one way or another, to share in the Cross, but this is something we never have to do alone. Our Lord is there at our side unseen, supporting us, and seeing that the journey and its pressures are not too much for us.

As I approach an important anniversary in my life this week, I have a strong sense of having been both led, and never abandoned. Twenty-five years ago I was ordained Priest at Lowestoft, where I was serving a curacy, and now after being Parish Priest at Bury St.Edmund's in Suffolk and East Dereham in Norfolk, I am back on the Suffolk coast, and have served for six years here at Felixstowe. Sometimes, like most other people, I've felt disheartened. I've had low times, as I'm sure you have had too. But somehow God never lets us get too low. He's always there to encourage us, and - maybe through the mouth of another person - give us the new hope and new vision which we need.

Sadly, we won't be able to sing any hymns at the Jubilee Mass on Wednesday. Singing in church is still forbidden. But I think that in my heart I will be singing Newman's words *So long thy power hath blest me, sure it still will lead me on.*

FELIXSTOWE

I don't know whether you see the weekly magazine *Country Life*, which was voted best magazine of the year in 2019. I've been fortunate in that an old friend has given me an annual subscription as a Christmas present for now nearly thirty years. Currently the magazine is running a series called *Beautiful Britain - Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty*, and a couple of weeks ago it was *Suffolk Coasts & Heaths* which was featured. There was a rather splendid full-page photograph of the Felixstowe foreshore, and then the write-up began

'Felixstowe never sleeps, a constant mechanical hum of human excess, container after container being loaded and unloaded, protected by the curving sea defences. In stark contrast is the silence, a few miles north of the river Deben, of this AONB, some 170 square miles of estuaries, coasts, and communities.'
