**Christmas Masses** The Christmas Masses will be at 5.0pm and 7.0pm on Christmas Eve, and at 9.30am and 11.0am on Christmas Day. Seating must be distanced, and it is possible for St.Felix to accomodate eighty people safely for each Mass. Like most other churches, we will be operating a ticket system. This is mainly to ensure that everyone doesn't decide to come to the same Mass! - with a maximum capacity of eighty, we need to spread out across the four times. The tickets, which will be numbered and each be in the name of a particular person - and which will, of course, be free - will be available after Masses from Monday this week, on weekdays from the Sacristy, and on the two Sundays from the Porch. If we find that more than three hundred and twenty people want to attend Mass, then I will put on a

fifth Christmas Mass. No one will find that there is no place available for them!

**Childrens' Christmas Cards** Further to the item in last week's Newsheet, Katy writes 'Looking to share some Christmas spirit? We are looking for some younger members of the Parish to make Christmas cards to share some joy with isolated parishioners this December. If you would like to draw a picture or card sending Christmas wishes, please deliver them to the Presbytery, if possible by December 13th. Please say 'from the children of St.Felix' on the card, so they know where it is from'

#### **ADVENT JOY**

This holy season of Advent is a time of joy. Sometimes in the past it has been seen as a little Lent. Yes, it is one of the penitential seasons in the Church's Year, but penitence, which is met by forgiveness, is not in itself a gloomy thing. In one of the readings which we use in Advent, we hear St.Paul exhort us 'Rejoice in the Lord always, and again I say rejoice'. And the Gospel reading which the church gives us for the first Tuesday in Advent begins with the words 'Filled with joy by the Holy Spirit, Jesus said.....' During Advent each year, we contemplate the events of the Annunciation to Mary, and her Visitation to Elizabeth, both of which are counted amongst the Joyful Mysteries of the Holy Rosary. Advent, a time of joy.

In this pre-Christmas period the world revels in its Yuletide - coloured lights, present buying, and in more usual times, parties. The world seeks after happiness in this season, and hopefully finds it. We Christians seek for something of another order and of a greater depth, namely Joy. Happiness, I think, comes from worldly things, material things, and from warm feelings and prosperous circumstances.. Take those things away, and it withers. Happiness cannot easily exist with hardship and deprivation. Joy can. For it is not dependent upon our own making and our particular circumstances. Joy is a gift from God, and can and does exist in situations which are less than comfortable.

In that Gospel reading. Jesus was 'Filled with joy by the Holy Spirit '. His Sacred Heart was of course completely open to that joy which the Holy Spirit gives. Maybe our hearts are not always open to receive this precious gift of Joy. Maybe we don't ask the Holy Spirit to bestow it upon us. He doesn't force his gifts upon us - part of the divine courtesy is that He waits until we ask, and have hearts open to receive.

Advent, a time of joy. How can we open our hearts to that gift of joy? By a prayerful contemplation of the wonderful things which God has done in coming amongst us, the Word made Flesh. By mediating upon the events which the early chapters of St.Luke's and St.Matthew's Gospels record. By looking, listening, longing, and loving. By having in our minds the wonder of the Incarnation, and the wonder of the Father's long preparation for that event in Israel's history. Come, Lord Jesus! Come to us Holy Spirit, with your gift of Holy Joy! Prepare us for the surpassing joy of the birth of Jesus, our Saviour and our Lord!
