Money Matters Last Sunday £470.20 was given at the Offertory, and £100.30 f0r CAFOD. £243.75 was given in the retiring collection, which was for the Dependant Priests' Fund. Today there is a retiring collection for Stella Maris - the Apostleship of the Sea. The Christmas Collection is given to the Parish Priest, as a basic constituent of his annual income.

Holy Water Last weekend someone said how much they miss the Holy Water stoup being available by the church door. Yes, sadly Holy Water by the church door is not currently permitted, because of the possible spreading of infection. But Holy Water is available from the Sacristy for your own use at home. Just bring along a little bottle, and I will fill it for you.

WAITING.....

I really like the Christmas Crib to be in the Lady Chapel, which is where it has been each year since I have been here. The advantage is that we can then have a Procession to the Crib, which is always a very special part of the Childrens' Christmas Mass. The children all carry candles, (electric ones!) and after the Bambino has been placed in the manger, we sing Away in a manger. This year, however besides no singing being allowed, a Procession is not advisable either, because it would present problems as regards distancing. And so it seems wise to have the Crib where it used to be, namely under the main Altar. The Bambino is traditionally placed on the Altar during the Christmas Mass, after which it can be placed in the Crib without any kind of procession being necessary. And it is, admittedly, a good place for a Crib - there at the centre of our liturgical celebration, and visually related to the

place where the Christ himself becomes present amongst us once more, in the Holy Sacrament of his Body and Blood.

This year, with the help of Chris who has made a new background, I've set up the Stable in time for this last Sunday of Advent. What you see is a representation of the Stable as it was before the arrival of the Holy Family, with just the animals who usually occupied it in place. Just a stable. Any old stable. There is though, I hope, a feeling of expectation about it. It is the scenery waiting for the drama to unfold. The drama which began when the Holy Family arrived in Bethlehem, and being unable to find any accommodation is shown into this stable. It then ceased then to be any old stable - as you see it today - and became the setting for the most wonderful thing imaginable - the birth into the world of God made Man - the divine Word come amongst us in great love and humility.

The coming of Mary and Joseph to that stable in Bethlehem, and the birth of Mary's divine Son, transformed the ordinariness, the lowliness, of the stable and made it immensely special, indeed a truly holy place. And the birth of the Christ within our hearts and minds as we receive him anew in Holy Communion, transforms us and makes us, like the stable, dwelling places of the incarnate God.
