FR.JOHN WRITES

It was a great relief to learn that in this new lockdown our churches can remain open, and public worship can take place as normal. Many of us had feared that there would be a return to the churches being closed, and services suspended.

What the government has said to us in effect is this: "We recognise how important it is to you at this stressful time to be able to go into church to pray, and to be able to support each other by joining in public worship. We have taken on board how much these things matter to committed Christians. And we are aware too of the care which the churches have taken regarding sanatising and distancing, things which have made churches safe places to be in. We understand too that you draw strength not just from being together with your fellow worshippers, but from the celebration of the Sacraments, and the grace which you believe to be available there. And so we are making an exception for church buildings, allowing them to be open, and worship to continue".

What reply are we to make to this message from the state, which seems to show sensitivity and understanding? Are we to say "No thank you. I don't want to go to church. . I'm quite happy watching services taking place on the screen."

Does such a reply seem gracious, and a good witness to our faith? I think we should think very seriously before making such a reply.

NEW SERIES - THE LORD'S PPRAYER

WHENYOU PRAY.....

Our Father, who at in heaven

Note that Our Lord teaches us to address God the Father, and that is what we usually do in our prayer. Yes, we can pray to Jesus, God the Son, or we can pray to God the Holy Spirit. But normally in prayer, as in the Our Father, we address the First Person of the Holy Trinity. We pray, as we say 'to the Father, through the Son, in the power of he Holy Spirit'.

The opening words of the prayer, 'Our Father', are hugely significant. By them, Jesus tells us how we are to think of Almighty God, what our relationship with him truly is: he is first and foremost our Father, not our Creator, our Lord, or our Judge. He is those things, but before all else he is our Father, who loves us and cares for us. He is our Father, we are his children. Our relationship with him is to be an intimate and deeply personal one. He is there for us, a loving Father to whom we can appeal in all our needs. This is a very wonderful and beautiful thing. It tells us something fundamental about God and about ourselves.

It also, I think, challenges us. It challenges us to live as those close to the Father's heart. When we disobey him, we are failing the One who loves us, we are letting our Father down. And when we disobey the Son's command that we should love our neighbour, we are hurting the loving heart of our Father, who is also Father of our neighbour. A good parents always hopes that his or her children will love and care for each other: it deeply saddens a parent when there is conflict and strife between their different children. Just so with God and us, to whom he has been revealed as a loving Father.

We have been taught to pray to our Father who is in heaven. It's not helpful to think of heaven as 'a place above the bright blue sky', but rather as another dimension of being, a great reality which at present is unknowable to us. We say that God dwells in 'unapproachable light', in a greater, not a lesser, reality than this visible one..
