THE GOSPEL FOR LENT I

It is suggested that we try to re-read the Gospel reading for the Sundays in Lent each day in the following week, and maybe think about the points set out beneath :

St.Mark 1:12-15

The Spirit drove Jesus out into the wilderness and he remained there for forty days, and was tempted by Satan. He was with the wild beasts, and the angels looked after him.

After John had been arrested, Jesus went into Galilee. There he proclaimed the Good News from God. 'The time has come' he said 'and the kingdom of God is close at hand. Repent, and believe the Good News.'

Monday It was the Holy Spirit who led Jesus into the desert, to be with the Father in prayer. How ready are we to let the Holy Spirit lead us into a daily time of prayer each day during Lent? And more generally, do we seek the Spirit's direction in our life? - or do we only listen to our own will.

Tuesday In remaining in the desert for the whole forty days, Jesus teaches us about perseverance, and persistency. How good are we at 'sticking at things'?- even for the full length of our daily prayer time? Does God find us reliable?

Wednesday Jesus was tempted by the devil, and so will we be if we try to keep a good Lent, with Prayer, Fasting, and Almsgiving. Satan wants to try to stop us doing these things. What might he tempt me to do or not do? How can I best overcome his temptations?

Thursday 'the angels looked after him' - we each have our Guardian Angel. Do we bother to try to discern what he is doing with us, and where he is leading us? Are we at all sensitive to his presence?

Friday Refreshed by his time of prayer, Jesus 'proclaimed the Good News'. He wants us to be doing this on his behalf now. How effective a Proclaimer am I in my manner of life, and in my words? Am I conscious of this part of my vocation as a Christian? Do I really long to witness?

Saturday Jesus says 'Repent'. We should take time regularly to look at our lives, and ask what actions and attitudes, what aspirations and ambitions, are not appropriate for a Christian to entertain. And then repent, seeking forgiveness.

WHEN YOU PRAY...... VII - As we forgive those who trespass against us

By precept and by parable, Our Lord makes clear to us the importance of being ready to forgive those who treat us badly. Indeed he tells us clearly that unless we are ready to forgive others, then we have no right to expect that our heavenly Father will forgive us.

Why, I wonder, does it matter so much that we should be ready and willing to forgive others? Partly, I suppose because a willingness to forgive is a characteristic of love - the love which Jesus commands us to have for our neighbour. It would be a nonsense for us to say that we loved our neighbour if we were not willing to forgive him or her. And also because this willingness helps us to conform ourselves to the likeness of Jesus, who was ready to forgive those who treated him so appallingly - 'Father, forgive them'.

I think Our Lord knows that sometimes we find it difficult to forgive, which, if we make the effort to do so, makes it more of an offering to him. Jesus never asks us to do the impossible, and so we can never say 'I can't forgive so-and-so', when this is what he asks of us. If we do say that, we really mean 'I don't want to forgive so-and-so'. What does it mean to forgive someone? I think it means to be ready to treat them as if they never had mistreated or offended us.

Jesus builds this kind of 'agreement' into the prayer he gives us. He causes us to say 'forgive us our sins AS WE FORGIVE those who sin against us. It is a solemn agreement, a promise, and the words should never be said lightly.
