THE 2021 SPONSORED RIDE AND STRIDE

This year the Suffolk Historic Churches Sponsored Ride and Stride takes place on Saturday September 11th, 9.0am - 5.0pm. As ever I am very enthusiastic about it: taking part in it has the following advantages:

- * It is a good way of raising money for our own church: we get 50% of whatever sponsorship money we raise.
- * It is a way of helping maintain ancient churches throughout Suffolk the Trust gets the other 50%, to assist churches in need of repair in the county. All of the church buildings are visible witnesses to God, and must be preserved. Many now have tiny congregations, which are unable to maintain the churches without outside help.
- * Taking part in the Ride & Stride has an ecumenical dimension: we visit the churches of other denominations, and meet the people manning them.
- * It is fun to take part, especially with other people whom we also get to know better.

Each year I'm very disappointed that only two or three people come with me on the one-and-a-half hour walk around the Felixstowe churches. Parishioners are generous in giving sponsorship, but how good if they actually took part, and raised sponsorship themselves! Can we try to do better this year?

All you need to do:

- * collect a sponsorship form from the back of church.
- * invite your friends to sponsor you, so much per church or a lump sum.
- * turn up and join in the walk on 11th! We will leave St.Felix at 2.0pm, and end at the Bethesda Baptist church at 3.30pm.

THE TEN COMMANDMENTS

3. You shall not misuse the Name of God

Many of us will be familiar with the older translation 'You shall not take the Name of the Lord your God in vain', and we will have felt offended whenever we hear people uttering oaths which use the words 'God' or 'Jesus Christ' in a casual, disrespectful, way. Just as we would be offended if we heard someone close to us, someone we love, being spoken about disrespectfully. That is because we love them, they are close to us, and it is just the same with regards to God. He is our Father, Jesus is our Brother, and we know that they should be spoken of with respect.

I think this Commandment is about respect, and about reverence towards what we know to be holy. Holy means special, set apart, worthy of honour. God is holy - our Lord and our God - and though He is also our loving Father, we should not think or speak of Him as if he were merely 'the man next door'. Our attitude towards him should always be one of reverence if we are to get our relationship with Him right. I think that in particular our worship of Almighty God should always be characterized by reverence. Sometimes modern worship seems to be lacking in this respect. And in some church buildings too there seems to be a lack of holiness, of the numinous. Jollity seems to sometimes trump reverence. It is why we should not talk loudly in church, or at inappropriate times. Our church building is a holy place, a special place, a place where encounter with God is made easier. Our churches should point us upwards to God rather than just sideways to other people. Respect for the Holy One is essential to the keeping of this commandment.
