He was a faithful and diligent priest, and something of a character, with his love of sailing and of model trains. I was glad to have visited him in hospital, as Dean, the day before he died; a day or two earlier he had received a visit from the Bishop. His funeral Mass will take place

THE SYNODAL WAY

Here are the last of the ten Questions which Pope Francis is asking the Church to consider.

9. How open are we to the will of God and the guidance of the Holy Spirit?
How do we discern the direction in which the Holy Spirit is leading us, rather than just following our own private enthusiasms and agendas?

Is my local community accountable and

transparent when it comes to making decisions and, if not, what would help to remedy this? Do I support the bishops and priests in arriving at their decisions?

10. How well do we hand on the Faith? Are we effective in sharing and passing on the Faith as individuals, as parishes, and as a diocese?

What would help us to do this better?
Can we see ways in which we might continue to work in a 'synodal' way - praying, discussing, and discerning together, not reliant on majority votes, but on a genuine consensus - a coming together of hearts and minds, under the guidance of the Holy Spirit?

THE KINGDOM AND THE WORLD

The Gospel reading last Sunday led us to contrast the ways and principles of 'the World' with those of Christ's kingdom. I was reminded of how different they are by reading the newspaper today. As I write, the papers are full of the Prince Andrew affair. We know that he has been very unwise, even very foolish: we don't, of course, know whether or not he is guilty of the serious crime of which he has been accused, and which he has consistently denied. And yet the journalists involved seem to gloat-over and delight in his downfall: they almost seem to wish that the allegations made against him could be found to be true; they revel in his supposed misdeeds, pointing accusing fingers at him, and writing endlessly about his shortcomings......

How different the reaction of the Christian should be: we should feel sad about the faults and failings of others, rather than point fingers at them and even seem to be jubilant. In the Temple, Our Lord said about the woman taken in adultery 'Let he who is faultless cast the first stone'. One wonders if the lives of those journalists who are so quick to condemn and malign the Prince are faultless? Which of us is in any position to condemn another? Jesus also said 'before you try to remove the splinter from your neighbour's eye, first remove the plank from your own.' When thers are being judged, condemned, there is, of course, usually a hint of hypocrisy.......
