'WELCOME, DEAR FEAST OF LENT'

That is the opening line of a poem by the seventeenth-century poet Robert Herrick, and it

suggests a quite different approach to the season of Lent, the season which we begin the keep this week : Lent as something to be welcomed, something to be enjoyed rather than endured.

How can Herrick be so positive? How can he see Lent as something which is not gloomy and negative, but quite the reverse? I suppose essentially because the opportunities which Lent provides, - opportunities of Prayer, Self-denial, and of Giving to others - are ways of drawing us closer to Jesus. Jesus is the source of all joy, peace, and contentment, and so coming closer to Him, and indeed becoming more like Him, can only lead us to happiness and well-being, rather than to gloom.

I think it is important that we approach Lent in a positive, even enthusiastic, way. With a spring in our step. And it is so good that it is something we undertake together. Yes, of course we will have our own individual programme or rule for Lent. We will have decided what we are going to aim at, when we will pray, what we will give to the needy, what we will give up by way of self-discipline. But nevertheless Lent is a communal undertaking. We will be encouraged by what others are doing, and they in turn will encourage by our example. We move forward towards the great celebration of the Dying and Rising of the Lord as one people, the people of God. This element of walking (and struggling!) together is an important aspect of Lent.

CLOUDS

No sooner has the cloud cast by the COVID pandemic begun to shift, than an even blacker cloud has descended - the brutal invasion of Ukraine by Russia.

Clouds block out the light of the sun, robbing us of our joy and of our peace of mind - in this case doing so as we feel so deeply for our brothers and sisters in Ukraine undergoing such anxiety, fear, and danger. Clouds can, if we let them, also block out our perception of the presence and love of God. We mustn't let this new cloud do this. Instead we must turn to God in fervent prayer, asking that peace and justice may somehow triumph. In union with the people of the Ukraine, let us ask that God may indeed 'deliver us from evil'.
