WHY DOES EASTER MATTER TO ME?

I think it is easy to enjoy the Easter celebrations without really feeling that it has anything to do with oneself personally. Of course we all like a story to have a happy ending, and we are glad that the story of Jesus didn't end with the terrible cruelty and humiliation of the Crucifixion. But has what happened at the first Easter really got anything to do with me? How does it effect my life here and now, two thousand years later? Is it really 'good news' so far as I am concerned?

It all, of course, focuses on Jesus. He claimed to be God the Son, and if that claim was true, yes I am connected with Him, because God is my Maker, he has brought me into being. Jesus

claimed to be the One with the Father - 'I and the Father are one' - and in doing that, he was claiming to have a role that extended far beyond his mortal life in the early first century. If, as he claimed, he was God, God the Son, then yes of course he is concerned with me here and now. God is everywhere, and at all times. It is part of what we mean by 'God'.

But was Jesus' extraordinary claim true? It's got to be if he is to be real to me here and now. As well as saying that he was divine, Jesus also said that he would come back from the dead - he said that he would be put to death, but that death would not be the end for him - he would rise from the dead. If he had been proved wrong, and his resurrection hadn't taken place, then we would have good reason to doubt his other claim, his claim to be God the Son. But he did rise from the dead: his friends saw him, touched him, ate with him, listened to Him after his resurrection. He appeared to them for forty days, so that there could be no doubt. And they were even prepared to be put to death - many were - rather than deny that all this had really taken place. They were reliable witnesses, with nothing personal to gain from telling a lie - quite the reverse. And they were unanimous in their witness.

So if Jesus is truly risen from the dead, and truly God the Son, then the implications for us individually are enormous. If he is alive, and is God the Son, then yes he is able to give us all that he promised us. He promised us life after this present life: 'I will take you to myself, so that where I am, you may be also'. He promised to give eternal life to us in the waters of baptism. He promised to give us his very self, his Body and Blood, in Hoy Communion. He promised to be with us always, to the end of time. He promised to give us his Hoy Spirit, to guide and comfort us. Wonderful promises, and promises that he can and does fulfill. And all of these things are only possible because of his glorious resurrection at the first Easter.

So yes, of course it matters to each of us personally that Jesus has risen from the dead. And we all of us have a real and personal reason to rejoice in the resurrection of Jesus in this Easter season! Christ is risen, we are risen! Alleluia!
