SOME DIFFICULTIES IN PRAYER

V. - WHAT ON EARTH SHALL I SAY?

That question points to a common misconception about prayer - namely that it's all about 'saying'. Whereas it is also about listening, thinking (meditation) and being silent. But of course there is 'saying', and that is proper : we do rightly want to speak to our heavenly Father. We just have to take care that we don't do all of the talking! - we don't get to know people if we don't give them chance to speak to us......

After we've eased ourselves into our prayer time, and we've already thought about that, I think it is wholly appropriate that we do a bit of thanksgiving. If someone has shown us extraordinary generosity, then as soon as we next encounter them we want to say thank-you! The problem is knowing where to start : God's generosity towards us is so immense. We might want to begin by thanking him for our body and mind, our health and well being. Then maybe for our home, our food, our friends. For our environment, for all the beauty we encounter in the created Order.Then maybe for things - cars, books, baths, armchairs. The list is literally endless.

After thanksgiving - and we should let the Holy Spirit lead us, as he takes and directs our memory and imagination - we may, having recognized how fortunate we are, want to pray for the needs of other people. We all know people who need prayer, and our faith tells us that we can, in a mysterious way, really be of help to them through prayer. People are very appreciative, I think of prayer made for them ; people sometimes tell me that they are praying for me and I find it deeply moving. And AFTER we've prayed for the needs of others, then it is natural and right that we should pray for our own needs. This may include bringing our anxieties and problems before God, asking for his help. As a loving Father, he won't fail to hear us, and come to our help in ways which maybe we didn't expect.....
