The Crib Festival At the time of writing our Crib Festival is still running its course. The church looks charming, and everyone is remarking on the amazing variety of the cribs on show - Cribs of all kinds, and from all parts of the world. There are almost one hundred of them. Although Barbara Lamberton planned and organised the event, it has very much been a team effort : many people have worked hard to make the festival the success it deserves to be. We are very grateful to them, and also to all the people in the parish who have lent their Cribs - often much-loved parts of their family's annual Christmas celebration. People have remarked too on how interesting the notes which people have supplied have proved to be, saying where and when the cribs were acquired, and why they are special to that particular person or family. It will be sad when the exhibition has to be dismantled!

The Christmas Masses People are already asking the times for the Christmas Eve Masses: there will be Mass at St.Felix at 6.0pm (Childrens' Mass) and at 10.0pm (The Mass of Midnight), and at the Convent at 8.0pm.

THE FRIDAY ABSTINENCE

I think some Catholics are genuinely unaware of the rule that we should abstain from meat on Fridays, and so the following reminder is timely:

The Bishops are urging all Catholics to refresh their weekly observance of the Friday Penance by abstaining from meat on that day. It is, of course, a reminder to us of the day of the Lord's passion and death. A recent study from Cambridge suggests that such a self-denial has had a surprising impact in reducing carbon emissions by as much as 545.000 tonnes each year

(equivalent of 82,000 people taking return flights from London to New York!)

The Bishops are also commending a Live Simply Award in response to the Holy Father's invitation in Laudato Si to work with generosity and tenderness in protecting this world which God has given us.

THE FOUR LAST THINGS

2. Judgment In Catholic teaching there are two moments of Judgment. One is the General Judgment, which we speak of in the Creed when we say that Jesus will come again 'to judge the living and the dead'. This will be at the end of time, when Our Lord comes in glory to inaugurate the Kingdom in its fullness. Then all humanity will be judged. The other judgment is the Particular Judgment, and this is when each person is judged at the moment of their death some passing straight to the beatific vision of God, some being condemned to hell, and some (presumably the majority) being committed to purgatory to be prepared for the beatific vision.

You may be familiar with St.John Henry Newman's great poem *The Dream of Gerontius*, so memorably set to music by Sir Edward Elgar. In the poem, after his death the soul of Gerontius is borne by his guardian angel to heaven, and for a moment, glimpses the glory of God. In that moment he recognises his utter unworthiness to be in God's presence, and he cries 'Take me away, and in the lowest depths there let me lie!': in doing so he embraces purgatory, recognising his need for cleansing before in due course enjoying the life of heaven. As imagined by Newman, Gerontius in fact judges himself, and maybe that it is how it will be with us: not God judging us, but we seeing ourselves as we truly are, and acknowledging that we have fallen short, and need preparation before being fit to spend eternity in the joy of God's presence.

Judgment is one of the 'Four Last Things' which we are reminded of in this season of Advent. It gives us an incentive to live in a more watchful way, seeking to please God in all that we do and think and say. Alertness to God is one of the great lessons of Advent.
