Social & Fundraising Committee I've mentioned before that I hope we will be able to establish such a Committee, and it seems that it is perhaps going to be possible. There will be an initial meeting at 7.0pm on Monday January 23rd, a week on Monday at the Presbytery. Anyone who would like to join in will be welcome. We will be able to pool our ideas about what social events we would like to see taking place in the course of the year, and how we might bring them about. We will hope to hold events which people will enjoy, and which will strengthen our common life. We will try to be mindful of what young & older people

might enjoy & what the various nationalities represented in our parish would like to see.

#### **EXPOSITION**

Someone asked me a day or two about Exposition - when the Blessed Sacrament is placed on the Altar in the silver Monstrance. What is the purpose? Why do we do it? Why do we need it in addition to the Mass? A good question - because we have two half-hour periods of Exposition in a normal week here - 10.0am-10.30am on Tuesday, and Noon to 12.30pm on Friday. Why?

I think we should think of Exposition as an extension of that moment in the Mass when Our Lord has become present in the bread and wine which has been transformed into his Body and Blood, and first the Host and then the Chalice are held up by the priest for us to adore Jesus (briefly) before the liturgy continues.. When Exposition takes place, that moment of adoration is extended; we can luxoriate for longer in the gracious and wondrous sacramental presence of the Lord.

One has to face the fact that very few people - certainly in this parish - take part in Exposition. Which is sad, because spending time with Jesus is a great joy and blessing. Why don't those people who have got the time to be at Exposition, do so? I wonder if one reason might be that people think they have got to have minds full of deep spiritual/theological thoughts when they are in the presence of Our Lord? It isn't really like that. It's just being with Him - giving Him our attention. Rather like sunbathing - just enjoying the warmth of the sun, soaking up its rays. Not doing anything more than that. Jesus is our best and closest friend. We don't need to be clever or over communicative with our close friends.

Listen to some words of Pope St.John Paul II - 'It is pleasant to spend time with Jesus, to lie close to his breast like the beloved disciple at the Last Supper, and to feel the infinite love present in his heart. How can we not feel a renewed need to spend time in spiritual converse, in silent adoration., in heartfelt love before Christ present in the Blessed Sacrament? The Eucharist is a priceless treasure: by not only celebrating it, but by praying before it outside Mass we are enabled to make contact with the very wellspring of grace.'
