THE EASTER OCTAVE

There used to be several Octaves in the course of the Christian Year, but now there are just two, at Christmas and at Easter. But what is an Octave? It is the seven days following a greater holy day, making eight in all, eight days each of which shares in the dignity and solemnity of the first. During the Octave, the Offices repeat the same hymn and psalmody each day, as if the greater holy day was simply extended to cover the Octave. The *Gloria* is used at Mass on each of the days, and on the Friday that falls within the Octave we are dispensed from the Friday abstinence from meat rule. Why not try to be at Mass on each day in the Octave?

THE BEST THING

I was depressed to hear in an advert for Sainsburys on Classic FM that 'the best thing about Easter is the food'. It brought home to me the emptiness of lives which have no spiritual dimension - and that means the lives of so many people today. For food to be supposed ' the best thing' about this time, that should be a time of great rejoicing over the victory of Our Lord Jesus Christ, and all that this means for humanity - how profoundly sad. The 'best thing' about Easter : it is the promise of eternal life, the assurance that death will not have the last word. Christ is risen, and we who are 'in Christ' by baptism, joined to the risen Lord, we will rise with him as surely as we must first also die with him. He rises with new life to share with us, and what could be better than that? It's more significant than a meal, however wellcooked that meal may be! For us Christians, food is certainly not 'he best thing' about Easter! And how we long for all people to know this, and have a real cause for rejoicing in this holy season.

And yet there is a way in which for us Catholics food IS 'the best thing about Easter' : the food which we receive at the Altar, the very body of the risen and glorified Christ. For when we receive Jesus in Holy Communion we are encountering the risen Christ as truly as his disciples encountered him on the first Easter Day. We are experiencing the wonder and the joy of that momentous day so long ago. Meeting the risen Christ at the Altar as truly as Mary Magdalen met him in the garden, meeting him, and more than meeting him - receiving from him a share in the new and endless life : how can ordinary food, the food we eat in our dining rooms or kitchens possibly be 'the best thing about Easter'? How fortunate we are to know that this is not he case!
