Money Matters Last Sunday £297.0 was given in cash at the Offertory, and £22.43 for CAFOD. Our Treasurer has provided some figures for our giving during the month of May : direct debits amounted to £2,270.00, and £39.35 was given via the new Dona machine in the porch. $\pounds 1,420.34$ was given on the plate. The overall collections during the month amounted to $\pounds 3,727.69$. Next Sunday there will be a retiring collection for Catholic Life Charities.

THE NAVE WINDOWS

It was reported in last Sunday's Newsheet that three of the window 'lights' - that is, one whole window - had already found sponsors : this Sunday we can report that three more 'lights' have been sponsored - that now amounts to two whole windows, a quarter of the whole project!

The first new window - the one over the Sacristy door - was being made-up last week, and will be installed in the next two or three weeks ; things are moving!

THE BLESSED SACRAMENT II

This feast which we keep today is named THE SOLEMNITY OF THE BODY AND BLOOD OF CHRIST. Of course we still know it by its old name of Corpus Christi - Latin for The Body of Christ. But the correct name reminds us of the equal status of the Body and the Blood. Sometimes the Precious Blood has seemed to be overshadowed or even overlooked. I heard a priest suggest last week that this may in part be because only the Host, the Sacred Body, can be displayed in the monstrance for adoration, and this in the poplar mind leads the Host to seem to have a superior status. Maybe that is so. But the fact is that the Body and Blood are of equal dignity, and equal in significance as regards the work of our salvation. The Body hung upon the Cross, and there the Sacred Blood was poured out - a vital part of the self-offering of Christ made on our behalf, and foreshadowed by the shedding of blood in the sacrifices of the Old Covenant. The Chalice containing the Precious Blood is, the Second Eucharistic Prayer declares 'the Chalice of Salvation'.

The General Instructions of the Roman Missal which I quoted last week speaks of the

reception of both the Host and the Chalice in Holy Communion as being a 'fuller form as a sign'. In it's wisdom, Holy Church now invites us to receive both the Body and the Blood. Indeed Jesus invites us to do so - eat this bread, drink this cup. Which is why we must think very carefully about whether we ought to follow the direction of the Bishops and begin to receive 'under both kinds' when the possibility of doing so recommences next month. Both the *Instructions* and the bishop make it quite clear that no one is being required to receive Holy Communion under both kinds. Quite simply, the risen and glorified Christ is equally present in both the Host and the Chalice, and so no one is 'missing out' by receiving just the Host. Each communicant is left entirely free to make their choice - no one is being dragooned into receiving the Precious Blood. Rather we are being invited and encouraged. 'Drink my Blood', Jesus said at the Last Supper, when he instituted the Blessed Sacrament. And we can't help but be moved by this invitation to partake of the Precious Blood shed for us on the Cross. I think it helps us to unite ourselves more closely to Jesus, and to have a deeper awareness of all that he has done to win for us the freedom of eternal life.

An invitation which we are free to accept or refuse. But what we are not free to refuse, I think, is an acknowledgement of what the consecrated chalice contains. It is truly the lifegiving Blood of the Saviour, and is to be treated with the greatest awe and reverence. Yes, we are free not to receive the Precious Blood if we wish. But it has been rather awful in the past to see those who chose not to receive it walking past, head held high, as if the priest or lay minister administering the Chalice was holding nothing more than a glass of tap water, and simply refusing to acknowledge the presence of the Precious Blood. If we are not receiving the Chalice, we should certainly genuflect or bow deeply as we pass the place where it is being administered. To simply walk past is irreverent, and a denial of the true presence of the Blessed Lord in the form of his Precious Blood.

Doors Now that the weather is rather warmer, it is good to leave the outside door of the church open. An open door says "Welcome, come in !" A closed door seems to say "Keep out!". But it is best for us to keep the inner glass doors closed.
