HOLY COMMUNION VIII

Last week in this series of articles on the Blessed Sacrament, written in preparation for the restoration of the Chalice to the Laity next Sunday, we began to think about our reception of the Blessed Sacrament. We recalled how that reception should be characterized by reverence and humility : 'Lord, I am not worthy that you should enter under my roof'.

We thought about our reception of the Host - about the correct way to receive the Host on the hand, and about why there are good reasons for receiving it on the tongue. Now we must think about our reception of the Precious Blood, although I don't think that there is very much that needs saying. Other, of course than that reverence and care should always be exercised, with a mindfulness and a wonder that we should be bidden by Jesus to receive him in this way. That reverence leads us, of course, to take the merest sip from the Chalice. Just occasionally one does experiences someone 'taking a swig', as the expression is, and that is always distressing because it does not suggest that the reception of the Precious Blood in this way is reverend, nor that the sacredness of this encounter with Our Lord is being recognised.

When we thought initially about what is said in the *General Instructions* of the Roman Missal, we read that to receive **both** the Sacred Body and the Precious Blood of Jesus is a 'fuller sign' : one thing of which it is a sign is that the living Christ is being received - the Christ whose Precious Blood is not congealed as a in death, but flowing into us, to cleanse and renew us, to be truly life-giving. From next Sunday we will be able to receive under this 'fuller sign' the risen and glorified Christ.

THE NAVE WINDOWS

Last week another full window was sponsored, this time by a charitable Trust, and another donation of £500 was received. We are most grateful.

So where are we now? Well five and twothirds windows have been sponsored, which leaves us with two and one-third to go. (Each window, you remember, is divided into three sections, or 'lights'.) Hopefully the remaining 'light' in the window of which two-thirds has already been sponsored will go soon, and then that leaves us with one full window, and one shorter window the one over the Lady Chapel arch. I'm still waiting to know the cost of that short window : it will be somewhat less than the £8,118 for the full length windows, but will have the disadvantage that any inscription will be less easy to read, being rather higher up.

The glazier is making good progress with the creation of the new windows, and soon the opportunity to have an inscribed 'quarry'(diamondshaped pane) will have past. It will still be possible to sponsor, but not to have an inscription. So if you are still thinking about sponsoring, please try to come to decision fairly quickly.
