THE NAVE WINDOWS

Most of the new windows are now in place. I do hope that you are pleased with them. For myself, I'm delighted : the church is flooded with light, and there is a new feeling of spaciousness. The architecture of the building seems to be enhanced, and the stained glass is shown up to better advantage. The glass itself is lovely : it is hand-blown, and has slightly uneven surface which makes it twinkle. The work should be completed in the course of this week, and then we will experience the full effect. The three young men who are doing the installation, Aaron, Tyrone, and Josh, have worked very hard and shown great skill and enthusiasm. It has been a pleasure having them around.

THE SIGN OF PEACE

I've mentioned before the *General Instruction of the Roman Missal* It's printed at the beginning of the Missal (the full Roman Missal, which we use on the Altar), and it directs how the Mass is to be celebrated. All priests are bound to follow the directions given there when they say Mass - they are not free to indulge in their own likes and dislikes, or in their liturgical fads and fancies. To some this might seem restrictive. But in fact it makes for the preservation of the unity of the Church, our all doing, in the supreme act of worship, the same thing. Unity, being of one mind, is the theme of today's Gospel reading, and so it is not inappropriate to think about our liturgical unity in the Roman Church.

As regards the Sharing of the Peace, the *General Instruction* says this :

'......There follows the Rite of Peace, by which the Church entreats peace and unity for herself and for the whole human family, and the faithful express to each other their ecclesial communion and mutual charity before communicating in the Sacrament.

'As for the actual sign of peace to be given, the manner is to be established by the Conferences of Bishops in accordance with the culture and customs of the peoples. However, it is appropriate that each person, in a sober manner, offer the sign of peace only to those who are nearest.'

Now this discouragement from roaming far and wide in the giving of the peace and seeking, it sometimes seems, to attempt to greet everyone within the church or chapel, may seem too staid, too restrictive. But it is easy, I think, to see why we are told to only greet those nearest to us. At that moment the Blessed Sacrament, the Body and Blood of Our Lord, are present on the Altar. It is a time of prayerful solemnity, when our attention should very much be centred upon Jesus. A wideranging giving of the peace in a jolly manner - is not, as the General Instruction says, 'appropriate' at that moment. A jolly greeting of friends, and of one and all, should really come after the Mass is over. It's a case of doing the right thing at the right time. And the 'sober manner' spoken of is the right thing at this solemn time of the Mass, when we are awed to be in the sacramental presence of the living God.
