OUR LADY OF WALSINGHAM

We are so fortunate to be part of the diocese in which the Shrine of Our Lady of Walsingham is situated - indeed to live in that part of England in which Our Lady chose to appear, back in the eleventh century. The story is a familiar one, of how Mary appeared to the Lady of the Manor at Walsingham, Richeldis de Faverches, and asked her to build a replica of the Holy House in Nazareth, the house to which the Archangel Gabriel came, bearing God's message and invitation. And where, when Mary said her 'yes' to God plan, the Incarnation took place, and the Word was made Flesh. The Holy House which Richeldis build was really a 'visual aid', as we'd call it today. A sign and a reminder, that Mary lived in an ordinary little house like other people, that she - who is now Queen of Heaven - was truly and fully human, so that the humanity which the Christ took of her was ordinary, authentic, humanity. He took our flesh to redeem our flesh; he was born of a human Mother.

Thus Walsingham is and always has been a Shrine of the Incarnation. That profound and life-giving truth is always at the heart of its

message. And what a wonderful truth it is: God with us, Emmanuel. God giving himself to us with a wonderful generosity, taking our flesh and making our humanity new.

Perhaps it was been the power of that message, and its visible proclamation in the Holy House, that drew people to Walsingham in everincreasing numbers. Throughout the later Middle Ages people from all walks of life, from Kings to peasants, wanted to follow the pilgrim way to Walsingham. They wanted to be in the place in our country which Mary had chosen. A place where they found a deepening and renewal of their faith, just as people continue to do today. Walsingham was chosen by Mary. So how could it fail to be immensely special, a place, it has been said, where the veil between this world and the next is very thin. The place where we come to our Mother's house, and experience her presence.

And so with great joy we keep today this Solemnity of Our Lady of Walsingham, thanking Mary for having come amongst us in our native East Anglia, and asking that we may be her loving and faithful children.
