COME TO YOUR CATHEDRAL!

A week tomorrow, October 16th, our Parish Visit to St.John's Cathedral in Norwich takes place. We will leave for Norwich from St.Felix at 9.30am by car, parking on arrival on the Cathedral car park. Then at 11.30am the Cathedral Heritage Officer, Dr.Richard Maguire will give us a guided tour of the building, telling us something of its history and pointing out the many features of interest, not least the magnificent stained glass, which has been called the best of its period in Europe. At 12.30pm we will have Mass in the Sunken Chapel, and then lunch in the attractive Garden Cafe the Cathedral Narthex. After lunch there will be time to either look around the Cathedral on our own, or slip down into the town. We will reassemble for Afternoon Prayer at 3.15pm, and leave for home at 3.30pm.

It looks as if we might be alright for lifts ; just add your name to the List on the noticeboard in the Porch, and if there are any further drivers able to offer lifts, please indicate that. After Westminster Cathedral, our own Cathedral in Norwich is the largest and finest Catholic cathedral in Great Britain. Here is a chance to get to know it better, and realise what a treasure we have. Do come along!

THE DAY OF RESURRECTION

At the Catechism Group last week we reached a point in the Catechism of the Catholic *Church* where we read about the Church's Year, and how at its heart is the celebration of the Resurrection of the Lord, week by week. For that is what Sunday, every Sunday, is : the day of the Resurrection, when we rejoice that Christ is Risen, alive for ever, and the source for us of endless life. From the very start Christians recognised the significance of the Resurrection : if Christ had risen from the dead, then not only did it prove that he was who he claimed to be, but also that he had new and endless life to share with his followers. And from the beginning Christians knew that the way to celebrate this event week by week was to 'do' the Mass - the Mass which Jesus himself left as his memorial, 'Do this, in remembrance of me'. And so week by week for two thousand years Christians have met together around the Altar, Sunday by Sunday to offer to the Father, and to plead, the Holy Sacrifice, Jesus himself, and then to feed on the Holy and life-giving Sacrifice, the Body and Blood of the Lord.

To offer, to feed, and to encounter. Because Jesus becomes present upon the Altar, our coming to Mass is always an encounter with the risen Christ. We encounter him each Sunday as truly as the disciples encountered him on the first Easter day in the garden, on the road, in the upper room. And so when we make our way to Mass on Sundays, we should always come with a sense of purpose : our purpose is to encounter Jesus. To come to where he is, and where he wants to welcome us, and give himself to us anew. It's why Holy Church, as our loving Mother, tells us to be at Mass EVERY Sunday - not just when it is convenient or when we feel like it. It is a strict rule of the Catholic Church that her sons and daughters should be at Mass every Sunday. And a wise and loving rule, because nothing could be better for us than to encounter our living and most loving Lord week by week.
