ATTENTIVENESS

Recently, when meditating on St Luke's account of the Transfiguration of Jesus - that event which is both mysterious and wondrous - I was struck by the sentence 'the disciples kept awake and saw his glory'. St Luke says that that they were 'heavy with sleep', but that nevertheless 'they kept awake and saw his glory'. Despite their tiredness, they watched and listened. They were attentive, and were rewarded by a wonderful experience of the glory of Jesus, the incarnate God.

Very often we are tired. And when not tired, distracted - distracted by all the things we have got to do and by all the things happening around us. We find it, even in our prayers, difficult to be attentive. And when we are not attentive to God, then we fail to see his glory. His glory revealed in the world around us - in nature in

people, in events - and in the course of our own life.

I think we should pray for the grace of attentiveness - and seek to co-operate with that grace when it is given. Pray to have eyes that see and ears that hear. By grace, the disciples on the holy mountain kept awake, and so saw the glory of Christ. That glory, in a hidden way, is there for us to witness in all kinds of ways. Only we must look out for it and be ready to see God's workings in ourselves, in others and in his world. Our eyes need to be open, and our ears open too. The divine is there always, sometimes hidden under the surface of things, waiting for us to notice and discover. It is easy to fail in awareness through inattentiveness. We must, like the apostles, keep awake, and be attentive. It is a vital ingredient in our searching for God.

OUR LOVING MOTHER

Last Saturday was the Feast of the Holy Rosary, and so at the end of both of the Prison Masses, at Warren Hill and Hollesley Bay, we sang a hymn in honour of Our Lady. We sang those hymns with great gusto, and I found it strangely moving. When we are at a difficult time in our lives - as I suppose someone in prison must be - then the maternal care of Mary is especially precious. Mary, who loves us as the brothers and sisters of her beloved Son, is not absent or judgmental; she is always there for us. She supports us by her prayers, and looks upon us with eyes of compassion and understanding. She doesn't turn away from us, however much we may have got things wrong - as all of us do.

October is the Month of the Holy Rosary, and we remember the profound saying of Pope St.John Paul II, that whenever we pray the Rosary we are 'looking at Jesus with Mary'. As we use the Rosary in this special month, as we 'look at Jesus with Mary', let us be especially aware that the Mother at our side loves us and cares for us. We fly to her like children, knowing our need of her maternal love, so constant, so unwavering. And knowing that although we are unworthy of that love, it is always available to us. We are never alone - Mary Our Mother is always beside us, even as she was beside her beloved Son when he hung on the Cross.
