WHAT THE SAINTS SAY ABOUT CHRISTMAS

St.John Chrysostom (AD 347-407) wrote: 'Behold a new and wondrous mystery. My ears resound to the Shepherd's song, piping no soft melody, but chanting full forth a heavenly hymn. The Angels sing. The Archangels blend their voice in harmony. The Cherubim hymn their joyful praise. The Seraphim exalt his glory. All join to praise this holy feast, beholding the godhead here on earth, and man in heaven. He who is above, now for our redemption dwells here below; and he that was lowly is by divine mercy, raised. Bethlehem this day resembles heaven; hearing from the stars the singing of angelic voices; and in place of the sun, enfolds within itself on every side, the Sun of justice. And ask not how, for where God wills, the order of nature yields.'

St.Teresa of Calcutta (AD 1910 – 1997) wrote: 'It is Christmas every time you let God love others through you Yes, it is Christmas every time you smile at your brother, and offer him your hand.'

HODIE

Easter has its special word, *Alleluia*, and I think Christmas has its own special word too – *Hodie*. It is a Latin word, meaning 'today', and is the first word of the Latin phrase *Hodie Christus natus est*, meaning 'Today Christ is born!'

Someone might well say "Today? Well I suppose you mean 'today' two thousand years ago - which is hardly 'today', is it?" No, Today. Hodie. George Herbert, the seventeenth-century poet, said of Easter Day 'There is but one day, and that day ever'. The same, I think, is true of Christmas Day. For the birth of Jesus, the coming into the world of the eternal Son of God, who has taken to himself our common humanity – this is a glorious fact which is a daily reality. The date doesn't matter, now or then. It has happened, it is true - today and everyday. True we celebrate Our Lord's birth on a particular day of the year, December 25th. But on every day of the year we rejoice in the reality of the Incarnation of God the Son. Everyday we greet Emmanuel, God-with-us. His coming matters as much, and is to be celebrated as joyfully, on this day as on that day at Bethlehem two thousand years ago. The gift is made new every day – not least through the Mass, where He comes amongst us sacramentally, as bread and wine wonderfully changed into his precious Body and Blood.

Christmas Day, the eight days of the Christmas Octave, the season of Christmastide which lasts until the Feast of the Baptism of Christ, each day of the year – all are *Hodie*, for the Christ has come amongst us, our Saviour, our God-made-flesh. His coming and his presence are ever new. What cause we have for joy!
