THE FIVE PRECEPTS OF THE CHURCH 2. CONFESSION

Paragraph 2042 of the *Catechism of the Catholic Church* reads ‘The second precept – You shall confess your sins at least once a year – ensures preparation for the Eucharist by the reception of the sacrament of Reconciliation, which continues Baptism’s work of conversion and forgiveness’.

One of the things that I find most sad – and indeed frustrating - as a Parish Priest is that most parishioners seem not to follow this precept. Of course it *may* be that the vast majority of people go to Confessors outside the parish (as they are perfectly free to do) but I’m too realistic to believe that this is the case. I’m sad at this neglect of this Sacrament of Confession by so many because those who do not make their confession are saying ‘No’ to a wonderful and necessary gift which God is offering to them, and this can’t make for their spiritual well-being. Unforgiven sin is a blockage in the channels of grace between us and God, and it needs to be removed. God has given us the means of bringing this about. Surely no one wants to live with blocked arteries – or drains?

Note how the Catechism links Confession with the two ‘primary’ Sacraments of Eucharist and Baptism. A wonderful truth about Confession is that when Absolution is given we are returned to how we were at the moment of our Baptism : totally cleansed in God’s eyes, free from any estrangement from our loving heavenly Father. Open to the grace which he wants to pour into our heart. Who could not want that? And then Eucharist : the Catechism says that Confession ‘prepares’ us for receiving the Body and Blood of Christ at the Altar. Indeed it does. And if we are truly alive to the wonder of Jesus giving us his very self in Holy Communion, then surely we will want to be as ready as we can be for him to come

into our heart? If the King were going to visit our home, wouldn’t there be some very purposeful cleaning in preparation for his visit?

So why is it that so many of us ignore the second Precept of the Church, namely that we should make our Confession at least once a year? I think that there are maybe three main reasons – Laziness, Pride, and Misunderstanding. Three rather ugly things!

Perhaps Laziness is too strong a word. Not-getting-down-to-it would be more truthful. We’ve all got so many things to do, and find it difficult to fit everything in. But we do have to be aware of what things really matter, and see that they don’t get pushed out. And being reconciled with our heavenly Father is something which certainly does matter, and should not be neglected.

Again maybe Pride is too strong a word. But Confession does always require humility, and that humility is in itself healing. Telling someone about our dark side is never a comfortable experience. But we should remember that the priest is bound to complete secrecy, and also that he himself has to go to Confession. He is in just the same boat. The only thing that he is there to judge is whether we seem to be genuinely sorry.

The word Misunderstanding, however, doesn’t need qualification. Many, I’m convinced’ wrongly think that only such sins as Murder, Adultery, Theft, etc. require Confession and God’s consequent forgiveness. In reality it is the small sins that bring each of us down : speaking and thinking unkindly, neglecting our prayers, being impatient, missing Mass , being critical and judgemental, being selfish or unkind. And can any of us claim to be entirely free from sins such as these?
