This is a really valuable part of Helping Hands and can make such a difference to people's lives, but I appreciate being a home visitor is not for everyone. FEEL LIKE A PILGRIMAGE?

Last Summer I was asked by some friends and acquaintances from Walsingham, Bury, and Dereham to lead a Pilgrimage to Tyburn, where so many Catholics were martyred. We all enjoyed the Pilgrimage so much that we decided to have another one during this Spring half-term. The venue this time is to be the Shrine of St.Etheldreda at Ely, and the date is Tuesday, February 20^{th} – a week on Tuesday. I wondered if any Felixstowe parishioners would like to join us? You would be most welcome. St.Etheldreda was a seventh-century East Anglian princess who became a Religious and founded a monastery at Ely. The Catholic church there has a remarkable relic of her, almost a whole arm. We plan to begin with Mass in the Catholic church at Noon (we would need to leave Felixstowe at about 10.0am) and then after a picnic lunch in the Parish Rooms we will go to the Cathedral to visit the place where the shrine stood before the Reformation. Normally it costs £14 to go into the Cathedral (outrageous) but Fr.David Finegan, the Parish Priest, has kindly arranged for us to be admitted free as pilgrims. Do tell me if you are interested. I can take three people in my car, and others cars may also decide to go.

THE FIVE PRECEPTS OF THE CHURCH 5. Providing for the needs of the Church

The Catechism of the Catholic Church para. 2043 says 'The faithful also have the duty of providing for the material needs of the Church, each according to his abilities'. What are the 'material needs of the Church'? Well, such basic things as lighting & heating in the church & hall, repairs and maintenance, the expenses of providing for a resident priest, etc.etc., which amount to quite a large sum each year. The Church is a family into which we are born by Baptism, and each parish is a family within that family. The grown-up members of any family who live at home all have to chip in with the expenses of running that home, and in just the same way it's right that parishioners all chip in (realistically) to pay the parish expenses. People can't – shouldn't - think that the church building and the priest are just there for them to use without contributing towards the costs. We don't expect to use the electricity supply at home without paying for it.

This fifth Precept of the Church reminds us that we should all be contributing to the costs of maintaining our parish, - its buildings, its worship, its priest – and furthermore doing so in a realistic way. When I see loose change – small change – in the Offertory on Sundays I really wonder whether everyone is doing their bit! The balance between income and expenditure in this parish is definitely precarious. It has certainly been better since the last Stewardship campaign, when more of you undertook to contribute by direct debit. The situation could be further improved if still more people chose to play their part by contributing to the parish in that particular way. If you don't give by direct debit, please will you consider doing so? And if you are only giving week by week what you gave five or ten years ago, please will you review the part you are playing in 'providing for the needs of the Church'?
