THE EMPTY BRACKET

Many old churches in Suffolk and beyond have empty stone niches, shelves, and brackets where there once stood statues of Saints, torn down and destroyed by the vandalism of the Protestant Reformation in the sixteenth century. Here at St.Felix we now have an empty stone bracket, set on the right hand side of the Chancel arch, but one

newly installed and awaiting the carved wooden statue of St.Felix which will be set in place on his feast day on Friday this week.

The bracket was made by the firm Abbeygate Masonry from Bury St., Edmund's, which provided the fine stonework in the Chancel – the Altar, Lectern, and Tabernacle plinth. The cost has been borne partly by the kind donor of the statue, and partly from our 'Alive in Faith' money, which was given for the re-ordering of the Sanctuary.

'IV'E GOTTA MOTTA'

Cities have them, Noblemen have them, Corporate bodies, etc. have them. What? A Motto. So why shouldn't ordinary people like you and me have one? Well I've decided to adopt a motto, and it's been provided for me by no less a person than Pope Benedict! The motto is, 'Choose to Love', and it comes from one of the addresses he gave when he visited England a few years ago. The phrase appears in a sentence which reads

'Every day, we have to choose to love and this requires help. The help comes from Christ, from the wisdom of his word, and from the Grace which he bestows on us in the sacraments of his Church.'

'Choose' to love: yes, we have to make the decision to love – it is an act of will. At least it is with the sort of love which Our Lord speaks of when he tells us to love God and to love one another. It is nothing to do with our emotions – no matter of champagne and pink chiffon – it is to do with how we treat people, how we speak to them, how we allow ourselves to think about them. Christian love concerns the will – our decision making process – and not the 'feelings'. So that when we see people who we find difficult or unattractive, or who are opposed to us, we CHOOSE to love them because we are disciples of Jesus – we choose to act, speak, and think in a way that is gentle, kindly, generous. Rather than being unfriendly, sullen, even hostile.

I'm grateful to Pope Benedict— one of my heroes — for providing me with a motto. Whether I'll live up to it is another matter. We can only try......
