MASS FOR THE SICK

Our annual Mass for the Sick will take place a week on Tuesday, June 25th at 3.0pm. At it, the Sacrament for the Sick (anointing) will be administered. The current practice of the Church is to anoint not just those who are suffering a serious illness, but also those who are in a continuing state of infirmity. This would apply to not a few of us older people. In the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick, God gives us grace to bear our sickness or infirmity, and, if it is his will, to recover from it. When a sick or infirm person is anointed, we can never know quite what the outcome will be. Certainly it is not magic, and instant or quick recovery should never be expected or assumed. But always – and this is what matters – grace is given : God-given help in the situation in which the person finds themselves.

You remember how in the Gospels people brought their sick friends to Jesus for healing. And regarding the Mass for the Sick taking place in ten days time, this is what YOU are called to do! Maybe you have a friend, neighbour, or relation who is sick or infirm, and who can't normally get to Mass? But maybe with your help and encouragement they could get to the Mass for the Sick? Please will you use these next few days to contact such a person, invite them to the Mass for the Sick, promise to accompany them, and arrange to either bring them to it yourself, or, if you have not got transport, to 'phone either Helping Hands (phone number overleaf) or myself and ask for help with transport. The success of this venture, and whether needy people receive help, really does depend upon you. Remember Jesus' words 'I was sick, and you did not visit me': they could be expanded to 'I was sick, I needed help from God, and you didn't enable me to receive it'.

After the Mass, there will be the usual Afternoon Tea in the Hall, which Edwina and her friends are kindly arranging. It is such a good opportunity for people who can't normally get out to see people, and have some social contact with others. As well as to enjoy a really good tea!

THE OLD TESTAMENT AS PREPARATION

I think we should see the first part of the Bible, the Old Testament, as a long and careful preparation for that decisive moment in history when The Word was Made Flesh – when God the Son took our human nature in order that he might redeem it, and win salvation for us. When we see the events of the Old Testament in this light they speak to us powerfully of God the Father's plan of salvation, and of the central place of Our Lord Jesus Christ within it.

Yesterday at Mass, the first reading was the account of that wonderful incident which happened when Elijah spent the night in a cave on the mountainside. (I Kings 19:9, 11-16.) There the Lord God passed before him : there was a mighty wind, an earthquake, and fire, but God was not in any of these. And then there was the sound of a 'gentle breeze', and Elijah knew that here was the manifestation of God which he had been promised. This manifestation of God to Elijah points forward to the Christ, who came amongst us to reveal the likeness of God, and did so in so gentle a manner. When he came amongst us there was no mighty wind, earthquake, or fire but a little child lying in a manger. 'He came oh so still, as dew in April', the old carol says. Jesus is the 'gentle breeze', so hidden and yet so powerful, the One to whom that 'gentle breeze' heard by Elijah pointed forward. Elijah 'covered his face' in reverence at the sound of the 'gentle breeze'. We likewise are right to feel that greatest reverence and awe in the presence of Jesus, God made Man, and hidden in there in the Tabernacle. Reverence and awe, as well as the truest love and trust.
