The Rosary Window

Last week I told you that the Parish Council had voted unanimously to make the conservation of the east window of the Church our next objective in using of the money which has accumulated from the Alive in Faith project over the past ten years. That money, I explained, can only be used for some specific project approved by the Diocese – it can't be used for general maintenance or running expenses. The Rosary window is of the same age as the Nave windows which needed to be conserved last year, and as with them the leading is past its effective life. Also the sheets of plastic which were placed over the outside of the Rosary window perhaps thirty years ago need to be removed. The Stained Glass experts which we used in the Nave state in their report

'We noted that all of the sheeting has a microclimate in the interspace between the leaded window and the sheeting. This was more than likely put on as the panels were leaking, but this has caused even more failures within the panels. We noted that at worst case the glazing is buckling to approximately 40mm from the true parallel position. We discussed various options including the removal and flattening of the panels, but we felt that as the panels have buckled too badly, it may be prudent to carry out a full releading which will ensure the stability of the glazing for at least one hundred plus years. Obviously we would not recommend covering the glazing again using Perspex.'

JULY – MONTH OF THE PRECIOUS BLOOD

Last month, June, was the month of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, and now that we are in July

the devotion of the month is The Precious Blood. We don't seem to hear much about the traditional devotions for each month these days, and yet how edifying the pattern is: each month our attention is focused upon a particular truth about the Faith, in which we see unfolding the wonderful working of God.

The Precious Blood brings before us the profound love of Our Lord Jesus Christ, and in doing so it follow on very naturally from The Sacred Heart in June. But now this further devotion highlights the cost of that love. True love always, I suppose, has an element of sacrifice and self-renunciation, and here we are reminded of the terrible cost of Our Lord's saving work. His love for us is so profound that he was ready to undergo death on the Cross, the Cross where his life – symbolized by his blood – was poured out for us. The supreme sacrifice, the giving up of his very life, was offered so that we might have endless life in the heavenly kingdom.

Perhaps as we keep this Month of the Precious Blood we might feel a deep gratitude for Jesus not only having shed his Blood for us on the Cross, but also in making that precious Blood available to us at the Altar. I remember venerating the famous Relic of the Precious Blood at Bruges some years ago. It wasn't a memorable experience because the person conducting the veneration was rattling a money box in front of Pilgrims – you virtually had to pay to venerate. Most unedifying. How different is our Holy Communion when in an atmosphere of reverence and devotion Jesus makes his precious Blood available to the communicant – not just to venerate, but to receive. A wonderful privilege. It would be good for us to reflect during this month of July on the love of Jesus revealed in his Passion and Cross, and also to seek to deepen our sense of reverence and awe as we receive that Precious Blood at the Altar.
